- This relationship is guided by the two-fold Christian practice of (1) contemplation and (2) action
- Contemplation: Silent
 Listening to discern what the
 Holy Spirit is saying
- Action: How the Holy Spirit wishes followers to behave

Progression of conversations: From a I-centred to We centered Conversions

Level 1: Transactional
Conversation:
Information Exchange to
validate what I have
already know

Level 2: Positional Conversation: A defense of what I know.

Level 3: Transformational Conversation: Participants discover what they don't know. It a share-Discover dynamic.





Difficult Conversations & Synodal Journey

Participants bring differing personalities, experiences, attitudes, spirituality, intentions, and emotions, etc



Five Conversation Essentials

- 1. Priming or preparing for trust: Without active priming for trust, no other essential tools will be effective
- Listening to connect: Asking questions such as: what are they trying to say? What are they thinking? What are they hoping you will help them explore? Can they say it in other words? I don't understand;
- 3. Ask questions for which you have no answers: Asking questions to guide people to where we want them to go. Allow self-awareness and self-discovery
- 4 'Double-clicking' that is repeatedly asking, why? What does this mean? What else?




Cordina's rebuts this view noting that Pope Francis studied and taught pastoral theology (not dogmatic theology) at San Miguel de Buenos Aires in Argentina, and does not aspire "to fulfil this role as a theologian but as a pastor ... " What truly disturbed the detractors, he points out, is that "his theology stems from . . . the reality of injustice, poverty and the destruction of nature, and from the reality of ecclesial clericalism."




Class Objectives

"Our internal GPS, rooted in the innermost recesses of the soul, will guide us to our destination so long as we remain steadfast in our determination." (Estelle Frankle)




"What I hear at this moment is similar to what Isaiah hears God saying through him: Come, let us talk this over. Let us dare to dream"



Pope Francis & Dreaming: A way of thinking that opens to the possibility of something new that the Holy Spirit is offering the Church. But to dream of a different future, he insists:

"We need to choose fraternity over individualism as the organizing principle" (Let us Dream)

The Call: To leave the familiar (homeland, families, culture and habits) for the unfamiliar.





Key characteristics of Abraham and Sarah's Journey (Estelle Frankel)

1. Embark on the journey with faith




2. A transformed life - in all kinds of unanticipated ways when they step out into the unknown.



3. Require the sacred use of imagination, "the ability to see things that are not yet visible or manifest."

Recall an unknown journey on which you, your diocese, family, parish, or religious community, or ecclesial community embarked. How did you experienced faith and fear as you faced the decision?




It is in this spirit of dialogue and openness, that the movement of the Holy Spirit reveals the secret destination of the Church.



An idol, as the molten calf (Exodus 32) is, "can be fully known in all its dimensions for it is finite and measurable, while the living God and Source of all being and becoming can never be known in its entirety.."



"Instead of standing in the presence of mystery that is in a constant state of flux, ever changing and becoming, moment to moment, we seek to reduce God to a concept or ideas we can understand" (Estelle Frankle)



Frankel reminds us that the biblical metaphor for clinging to certainty, fixating on the past, and trying to control everything is idolatry - the reduction of that which is infinite to that which is finite. It manifests in our extreme admiration and reverence for something, someone or some idea.

"Turning the living God into an idol..."



"In moments of anxiety or uncertainty, when we tend to seek comfort in old patterns and familiar habits, like the addict who reaches for his substance of choice when faced with stress or uncertainty..." Estelle Frankle)



Pope Francis presents the metaphor of a pilgrim to demonstrate the importance of conversion in the synod journey. He says that a pilgrim is one who "goes out from herself, opens herself to a new horizon, and when she comes home, she is no longer the same, and so her home won't be the same" (Let us Dream, Pope Francis)
